On May 12th and 15th School parties visited performances of "Twelfth Night" which were given by the University College Dramatic Society.

The School Choir once again took part in the Festival Concert of the Eastleigh Schools' Music Association, which took place at the Town Hall on June 13th. School pupils played violins and Anne Tryhorn sang a duet with her brother.

Members of Form U.V., with Miss Meakins and Mr. Beck, visited Christchurch Priory on July 11th. The following day, Form VI, together with some of U.V., visited Cheddar Gorge, Wookey Hole and Stonehenge. This trip was arranged by Mr. Sansbury.

SOUTHERN COUNTIES RAILWAY SOCIETY

Since the last report of this Society, only one meeting has been held at the School. It should, however, be realised that this is only a branch of the Southern Counties Railway Society, and that at the other meetings held at Romsey, Southampton and Brockenhurst we have been well represented. The one meeting in question took place on May 20th, when Mr. C. R. Clinko, the Vice-President of the Bristol Railway Circle and author of many books on railways, gave us a very detailed account of the Midland and South-West Junction Railway, including in his talk several lesser known railways connected with it.

The Annual General Meeting was held at Basingstoke on June 18th, and in addition, a number of visits to running sheds and railway work-shops have been arranged. These included one to Kentish Town (London Midland Region) and Stratford (Eastern Region) Motive Power Depots on July 17th.
